In a special intensive summer project, third through sixth graders worked together to create this mural that illustrates an African proverb. This 4x6 ft mural is located in a main hallway, next to the auditorium and cafeteria entrances. Project sponsored by ArtsPartners/Young Audiences of North Texas.

An Asian proverb was the inspiration for this three panel (3x6 ft each) mural that was created for the school cafeteria by 3rd - 6th graders. Parents and volunteers worked alongside t children on this ArtsPartners/Young Audiences of North Texas.

Mosaico de Saldivar - Julian T. Saldivar Elementary, DISD I: Spring 2002; II: Fall 2002

Fourth and fifth grade students gained inspiration from Mexican folk art as they created these murals to celebrate their rich Hispanic heritage. **Project I** (3x I 6ft) is located on a curved wall on the front of the school and **Project II** is a group of seven medium sized panels which fill one wall in the cafeteria. Both were ArtsPartners/Young Audiences projects.

Imagination in Motion - Rosemont Elementary, DISD Fall 2001

This unique mural was designed to fit into existing, organic shaped recesses on an exterior front entry wall. Designed from abstract free-flowing watercolors, fourth through sixth graders created this mural to celebrate imagination and community. Sponsored by ArtsPartners/Young Audiences/21st Century.

Soaring High - Maple Lawn Elementary, DISD Fall 2000

This outer space mosaic (5x9 ft.) reflects Maple Lawn's school theme "soaring high: to places and ideas, real and imagined." It also represents their school mascot, the Rockets. Both the theme and mascot were chosen because of the school's proximity to Love Field Airport. This ArtsPartners/Young Audiences /21st Century Project was created by thirty fourth through sixth graders.

The Learning Tree - Thomas Tolbert Elementary, DISD 1999 - 2000

Forty fourth through sixth graders created this mosaic (5x | 2 ft) in an ArtsPartners/Young Audiences Program during the school's 2 l st Century Leaning Center after-school program. Tolbert is located in heavily wooded part of Oak Cliff, A large tree, and the animals which live in and around it, was chosen to represent the sheltering and nurturing aspect of a school in a community.

Honor Our Past - Imagine Our Future - Greenhill School, Dallas 1998 - 1999

50th Anniversary Mosaic Project

The images of this mosaic (5×12 ft.) were taken from various aspects of the school's history and campus. They were used as symbols to represent characteristics of the school such as reliability, growth, creativity, community, etc. One hundred and eighty 5th and 6th graders rotated through the design, tile layout and installation.
